We hope you had a wonderful holiday season and we look forward to another exciting year at Matheson Memorial Library in 2013. During the next few weeks, I will be working on our annual report for 2012 and as I think back over the past year I can recall the many improvements we made. Thanks to memorial funds we received from the Barbara Morrissey estate and from the Paul Schmidt estate, we were able to purchase the new Information Desk and comfortable seating by our entrance. We also purchased new paperback shelving and the two chairs with tablet arms for our upper level. This is a great spot for patrons to work on their laptops or study. Other improvements last year include our new self-service holds shelf and self checkout station. Patrons have really taken to this self service model and it has proven to be a time saver for staff. We are so

grateful for the memorial funds that made these changes possible. In 2012 we were also able to replace our incandescent lights with new LED lighting. These energy efficient lights will save us money for years to come.

We have decided to finally make the leap and withdraw our older formats- both VHS movies and audiobooks on cassette, to make room for more audios on CD, playaways, blu-rays and other formats. They will all be withdrawn from our collection over the next few weeks and will be put in our Friends book sale in January. If you still have a VCR, plan to attend the book sale starting January 17 for Friends members and January 18-19 for the general public so you can increase your own video library. There will be many

classic movies on VHS and a large number of Star Trek videos for sale.

As we look ahead to future improvements, we know that we will soon be ordering some new computers for the library and updating our operating systems and software, like Microsoft Office. This will make computer classes easier to teach. Check this newsletter for upcoming computer classes and for classes to show you how to download ebooks to various devices using Wisconsin's Digital Library. We are excited to offer Zinio in 2013 that will allow patrons to check out 100 different magazine titles to ipads or other devices. There is always something new at the library!

Special Services

Computers for public use. There are 15 computers available for general use at the library. All of the computers have high-speed internet access as well as Microsoft Office 2007 Suite. We also have 5 computers that can be used to browse for materials housed within our library or throughout our 52 library system. With your card, you have access to more than 2.8 million items!

Wi-fi. With your laptop or other internet-ready device, you can have access to the built-in wi-fi at the library. Simply connect to the lower level or upper level access points.

Adult Book Clubs. Page Turners Book Club meets the 1st Wednesday of the month at 6:30 p.m. The Afternoon Book Club meets the 3rd Wednesday of the month at 2:00 p.m. Check out a copy of the books at the library!

Audio/visual services. Includes the circulation of books on CD, Playaway and MP3, music CDs, DVDs and blu-rays of both feature films and how-to's.

Local history collection. Provides information of historical value on the city of Elkhorn, Walworth County and the state of Wisconsin. We also have obituary clippings that were published in the Elkhorn Independent dating back to 1974.

Study rooms. There are three study rooms available on a first come, first serve basis.

Interlibrary loan. We can obtain materials from around the state and across the country when they are not available through our library consortium.

BookMyne. The app that makes it quick and easy to access the library on the go! Search the library's catalog, download items, manage your account, and find suggested reading instantly with your Android or iOS mobile device.



AUTHOR SPOTLIGHT

David Baldacci (pronounced Ball-DAH-chee) was born in 1960. He graduated with a Bachelor's degree in political Science from Virginia Commonwealth University and then received a law degree from the University of Virginia. He started as a trial lawyer and then later became a corporate lawyer in Washington, D.C. Today he is a full time writer and tries to publish two novels a year. David started his career in writing when he was in elementary school after his mother gave him a notebook. It was later in high school and college that he really started to write seriously. His first novel *Absolute Power* was an instant bestseller. It was made into a movie starring Clint Eastwood. Baldacci has written over 20 novels with many published internationally in over 45 languages. His published works include the Sean King and Michelle Maxwell

Series, Camel Club Series, Shaw and Katie James Series and the John Puller Series. He has also written stand alone novels including: *Power*, *Total Control*, *The Winner*,

The Simple Truth, *Saving Faith*, *Wish You Well*, *Last Man Standing*, *The Christmas Train*, *True Blue*, *One Summer*, and *The Innocent*.

Did you know...

David Baldacci is the author of two Children's books *Fries Alive* and *The Mystery of Silas Finklebean*.

David has written the Screenplay for *Wish You Well* and is working to bring it to the big screen.

He is involved with several charities such as The National Multiple Sclerosis Society and his own called Wish You Well Foundation which supports literacy.

The Hit is scheduled to be released in April 2013.

DOWNLOAD FREE MAGAZINES

Zinio is an online newsstand made free to you by Lakeshores Library System. With your library card, you will be able to read free magazines on your computer, tablet or mobile device. Knitter's magazine, Consumer Reports, Men's Fitness, Marie Claire, Weight Watchers, Cosmopolitan, Food Network and PC Magazine are just a few titles you will have access to.

You will need to set up two accounts—a library Zinio account and a Zinio viewer account. By using the same email address at registration, Zinio will be able to link your accounts.

Get started by visiting the Zinio section at www.elkhorn.lib.wi.us/wordpress/elibrary. After you have set up your Zinio accounts, you will access your free library downloads through your library Zinio account.

Browse for a magazine and select for download by

clicking on the cover. A new browser window will open with your downloaded magazine.

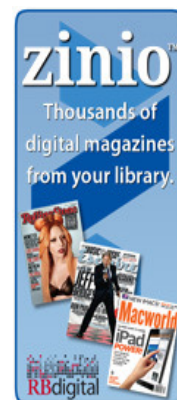
Magazines are available for off-line viewing. Simply download Zinio Reader 4 on your computer.

Zinio works on PC, Mac, iPhone, iPad, Android, Kindle Fire and Blackberry. Download the app in the app store.

You can download an unlimited number of magazines and keep them for as long as you wish. There are no due dates or fines.

FROM THE YOUTH SERVICES LIBRARIAN

It's a new year and we have lots of great new programs and books in the youth services department. Regular programs will resume on January 11 and we will be offering all our popular storytimes and after school clubs as well as some new programs.

If you've never attended an after school club at the library, now is the time to start! Lego Club and Messy Art Club are open to kids of all ages and families are encouraged to attend. Just drop in any time between 3:30 and 5:00 p.m. and stay for ten minutes or an hour. At Lego Club, we encourage creativity, imagination and motor skills. The library provides all the Legos and kids build and display their creations in the library until the next meeting. Lego Club is also a great time to check out new books – we display the current new titles, often before anyone else has seen them! Messy Art Club has a different project at every meeting; some of our past projects include collage, painting, planting seeds, chalk art, quilting, leaf art, twirling ladybugs, and more. Our art projects are designed to be easily enjoyed by the very youngest and still offer a creative challenge to older participants.

With all the great programs we offer at the Matheson Memorial Library, it's not surprising we had over 11,000

children and parents attending programs in 2012. However, it does mean we will continue to require registration for some programs. Registration keeps our more popular programs from becoming too chaotic and lets everyone have a good time. Toddlers 'n' Books will require registration at the door – check at the children's desk to get your sticker. The limit is 40 people (children and adults). If the 10:00 a.m. session is full, families will be asked to wait and attend the 11:00 a.m. session. Pre-registration is required for all We Explore programs. Registration limits vary, depending on which room the program is held in. You can sign up online, over the phone, or in person at the library.

TEENS ON SCREEN

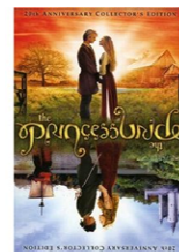

The library prepare name tents for all the soups and supplies power to keep all 20 plus slow cookers warm. Each participant will also receive a recipe booklet including all recipes at the tasting. After tasting soups for nearly an hour we take a break to vote for our favorite soups. The top

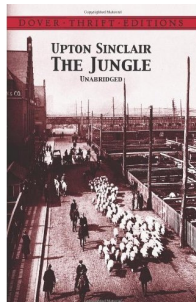

PAGE TURNERS BOOK CLUB KICKS OFF BOOKS BY THE DECADE

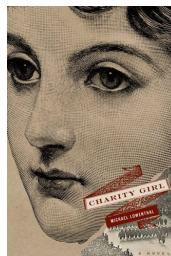

conditions in the U.S. meat packing industry and caused a public uproar that partly contributed to the passage of the Pure Food and Drug Act and the Meat Inspection Act in 1906.

"Charity Girl" by Michael Lowenthal is our February 6 selection. Charity Girl examines a dark period in our history, when fear and patriotic fervor led to devastating



consequences. During World War I, the U.S. government waged a moral and medical campaign, incarcerating and quarantining fifteen thousand young women who were found to have venereal disease.

We welcome new book club members year round. Can't make it this month? That's okay. Join us when time allows. Copies of the book club selection can be picked up at the circulation desk 3 to 4 weeks prior to the book club meeting.

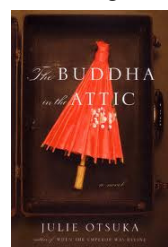
AFTERNOON BOOK CLUB WELCOMES YOU

On January 25 at 10:00 a.m. we will show "Fahrenheit 451" featuring Julie Christie and Oskar Werner. Acclaimed as a modern classic in

the vein of Brave New

World and 1984, this outstanding novel by Ray Bradbury is brought to screen with all its vividness and imagination intact. Set in the future electronic age, all books are banned and firemen must keep fires burning at 451 degrees—the temperature at which paper burns. Registration for this film is not required.

Join us in February for "Gone with the Wind," a 1939 American historical epic film adapted from Margaret Mitchell's Pulitzer-winning 1936 novel of the same name. It was

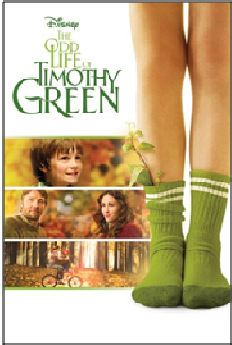
