





RFID- WHAT DOES IT MEA

• FID (Radio Frequency IDentification) is the latest technology to be used in library theft detection systems. Unlike EM (Electro-Mechanical) and RF (Radio Frequency) systems, which have been used in libraries for decades, RFID-based systems move beyond security to become tracking systems that combine security with more efficient tracking of materials throughout the library, including easier and faster charge and discharge, inventorying, and materials handling. (American Library Association)



Here at Matheson Memorial Library we have decided it is time to purchase a RFID system and security gates due to a large number of missing books and movies. Unfortunately, theft has been an ongoing problem for the library.

Tagging our entire collection is a big project and we have spent the last two months working on it. It is going to take at least two more months before we are finished and we are looking for volunteers to help us. Please see Gail at the circulation desk if you are interested in training.

On December 26th, we turned our security gates on for the first time, and we ask for your patience as we work out the kinks. Our staff has to get used to new check out procedures. Since our old tabletop self- check out

machine is not RFID compatible, we have removed it and replaced our kiosk with a new one from 3M. In the future we may use this for check in as well, but right now it is only for check out.

Once all our items are tagged you will not have to scan each barcode, but simply place the items you want to check out on the pad and it will read the RFID tags, check them out and unsecure them so you can go through the gates.

RFID is useful for other things as well. Not only will it facilitate the check out and check in process, but it will be useful to inventory our collection. This will tell us if items are missing or out of order on our shelves. At some

point in the future we may even get an automated materials handling sorter. This is a machine that will automatically check in and sort books that are returned. Our patrons can quickly self return items with 'real-time check-in". With this feature, they can be assured items are instantly checked in upon return. This allows them to check out items without exceeding loan limits in the same visit.



Don't forget to sign up for text alerts or follow the library on Facebook to keep up with programs and announcements or check out our Pinterest page to see the latest new books.




