The 2014 year ended on a positive note and I'd like to report that our circulation for the year increased to 247,340 items, our highest annual check out ever. We will be printing the highlights from our 2014 annual report in March and will make that available to the public. This year is off to a good start and we look




This free event is sponsored by the Friends of Matheson Memorial Library. Please arrive early to ensure a seat! Book signing to follow. Books will also be available for purchase.



NEW ADULT NONFICTION: 635 GARDENING




Region of spring, I start thinking about one of my favorite activities: gardening. Our days of slushy snow and overcast skies will eventually change into warm soil and sunshine (sooner than later would be nice!). But before I head out to the garden, I like to research new gardening techniques and plants.

Whether you're a seasoned pro, eager novice, or somewhere in-between like me, the library has many resources for you to consider. One of the best ways to learn about current gardening trends is to read magazines. We subscribe to at least 8 different gardening-related print titles, such as *Organic Gardening*, *Horticulture*, and *Fine Gardening*. The newest issues are available to read inperson at the library, while back issues can be checked out for 7 days. Or, if you prefer to read magazines electronically, you may want to try *Backyard & Garden Design Ideas* via Zinio.

We also offer books on myriad gardening topics. You will find them under the 635 call number in our adult non-fiction collection. Don't forget to stop at the

NEW non-fiction section for the latest books. If you are concerned about garden pests, you may be interested in *The Wildlife-Friendly Vegetable Gardener* by Tammi Hartung. She offers unique solutions on how to garden in conjunction with wildlife. Perhaps you're wondering if watering





tomatoes with sugar water will make them sweeter, or, if red flowers will attract hum-

mingbirds. *Coffee for Roses* by C.L. Fornari will answer these questions and many more, debunking common gardening tricks. Or, maybe you want a Wisconsin point of view. I highly recommend *Garden Wisdom* by Jerry Apps. Apps provides

a wealth of practical advice and anecdotes from his 60 years of gardening experience.

If you would like to listen to gardening books, or read an electronic book, you could download an audiobook or e-book from Wisconsin's Digital Library. Some interesting titles include *Scented Plants*, *Invasive Plants of the Upper Midwest*, and *Garden Rescue*.

I look forward to getting to know all the wonderful children and families that visit the library!




Spotlight on Youth Programs
