ave you joined our Summer Reading Program yet? It's not too late. Kids will get stickers, coupons, fine forgiveness and lots of fun incentives, and adults have a chance to win some very cool prizes. Adults

have a weekly challenge based on the theme, "Libraries Rock!" and many programs for all ages. Stop in and sign up!

Our outside project was completed in time for us to plant some vegetables in our new garden beds and a new walkway was installed from the story room to the garden. If you want to make a tax-deductible donation to help our garden grow, please make a check out to the Matheson Memorial Library (MML) Foundation.

Starting August 13, construction will begin on the library parking lot. Although a lack of sufficient parking is our biggest complaint at the library, we are not able to provide additional parking spaces in

the small lot we have, but we are going to improve the flow of traffic to allow two-way traffic from both Wisconsin and Washington Streets. Be prepared for big changes as the book return will be moved and traffic will flow differently through the parking lot. During construction there will be some parking on Washington Street . REACHING OUTSIDE THE LIBRARY

t the youth services department of the Elkhorn library, we like to get outside the library and visit kids where they are. During the school year, we visit four year old kindergarten classrooms, school classrooms, and OPtions. Visits may include a storytime or give children the opportunity to check out books from our special outreach collection, Library on the Go. You may run into library staff at a 4K Family Night, checking out books in the reading corner, or at a local event like the Elkhorn Mini Maker Faire or the Get Fit Fest, offering activities and library information.

We also offer field trips to the library, and are lucky to have a great school district whose teachers organize their busy schedules so kids can visit the library. This year we offered field trips to grades kindergarten through fifth grade; students not only got the experience of visiting the library, they each got a special program from scavenger hunts to art programs.

When the librarians can't leave the building, our books are still traveling! We supplement the school

collections with hundreds of books per month. Teachers can sign up for a classroom card and request materials, which are then checked out and sent over on the school delivery van. We love to see all the fun requests and offer suggestions! We've provided multiple copies for classroom book clubs, curated collections based around a subject area, or extra fun books for beginning readers.



During the summer, outreach switches over to Library on the Go. This grant-funded collection offers children who don't have library access the opportunity to borrow easy readers and beginning chapter books with no due dates, fines, or library cards required. You'll see Library on the Go at local daycares, at summer school, and many other

places in the community.

Sometimes outreach seems more trouble than it's worth. When we've had a field trip with 90 third-graders, done back-to-back storytimes most of the day, hauled books and props all over town, or been gone from the library for hours, with work piling up behind us, we can wonder if we're really making a difference. The answer is, yes! Over the past years, as we have increased outreach we have seen an increase in library visits from kids and families who might not otherwise have visited the library. The kids tell their parents about the librarian's visit or their field trip and then come back to investigate further. They come to visit the gerbils Ms. Jennifer told them about, to check out the video games their friend told them the library had, or to spend more time in the play area. New (and busy) teachers find out more about the library's services and how we can help them by supplying books and other materials. The early literacy programs we take to four year old kindergartens and daycares give teachers new ideas as well as reaching kids who don't have the opportunity to visit the library. Library on the Go offers literacy opportunities to disadvantaged or just plain busy kids.


In just one month, we might visit or see anywhere from 50 to 500 kids. We will read stories and learn vocabulary words like "nocturnal" and "oviparous". We will learn how the library is connected to the community and how each staff member contributes. We might learn how to choose a "just right" book from the easy readers or which areas of the library are for being quiet and which ones are for

playing. Children might discover that they do love reading after all, when they check out their first book or find a familiar friend. Outreach allows us to not only support our school colleagues and help them educate Elkhorn's children, but also reach as many families as possible and help children become lifelong library users and lifelong learners.

CAST YOUR VOTE FOR THE GREAT AMERICAN READ!







he Afternoon Book Club is a relaxed group of people who just enjoy sharing a great book! They meet on the third Wednesday of the month at **2pm.**


