






will be showing us how to do hands-on scientific activities! Small children are welcome, but must be supervised.


On Tuesday, **August 6th at 6:30pm**, Apollo Astronaut Historian Jim Gibbons will discuss the space goal proposed by President John F. Kennedy in 1961 and how it was fulfilled for the U.S. in 1969. he Page Turners choose moving and poignant stories to highlight the human condition. They meet on the first Wednesday of the month at **6:30pm**


July 3rd - All the Missing Girls by Megan Miranda

Maid explores the underbelly of upper-middle class America and the reality of what it's like to be in service to them.




