he Afternoon Book Club is a relaxed group of people who just enjoy sharing a great book! They meet on the third Wednesday of the month at **2pm**.


Sept. 18th – *The Book Woman of Troublesome Creek* by Kim Michelle Richardson

#### **NOT ENOUGH APOLOGIES: TRAUMA STORIES**




Many Wisconsinites have experienced traumas in childhood, but their effects are not universal, nor are their burdens evenly distributed among the state's different communities. Depending on the individual, trauma can have a lifelong impact, affecting behavior, relationships and physical, emotional, and mental health. The documentary, Not Enough Apologies explores how adverse childhood experiences can result in changes to the brain, leading to cascading behavioral and mental health problems. Discover how service providers across Wisconsin are working to be responsive to trauma in efforts to change the trajectory for affected children.

Staff from New Beginnings will be on hand to discuss their observations on these important issues.



places matter to people. Although people often feel very deeply about the old places of their lives, they don't have the words to express why.




Desimone brings these ideas together in evocative language and with examples of local, regional and national "old places."
